

Youth Suicide Prevention: Intervention Training for Medical and Primary Care Providers

The Oregon Pediatric Society is offering two, 1.5-hour virtual skills booster training sessions that focus on youth suicide intervention. The training includes an overview of concepts, tools, and office workflows; large-group case-based learning; peer sharing and safety planning. The trainings are complimentary; there are no registration fees.

Learning Objectives

- Increased understanding of the importance of universal screening for suicide risk.
- Familiarization with the most common means of death by suicide and how to assess risk based on the feasibility and lethality of method.
- Improved comfort with using safety plans to intervene with youth experiencing thoughts of suicide.
